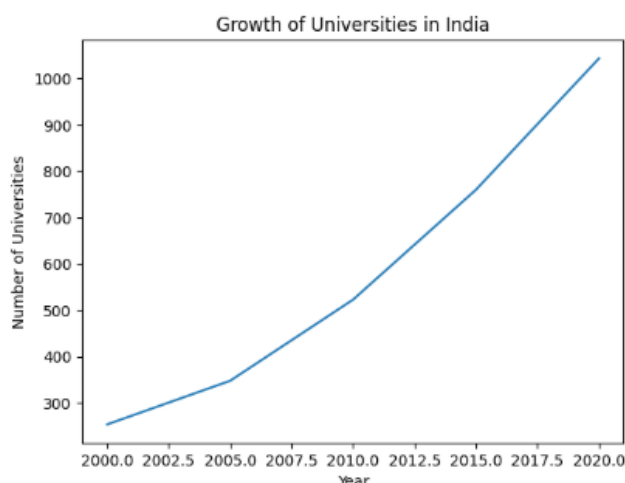


Figure 1: Clearly indicates a steep rise in the number of universities, reflecting increased demand for higher education. However, despite this impressive quantitative expansion, serious concerns persist regarding quality, relevance, equity, governance, and international competitiveness. Rapid growth in enrolment and institutions has not always been matched by

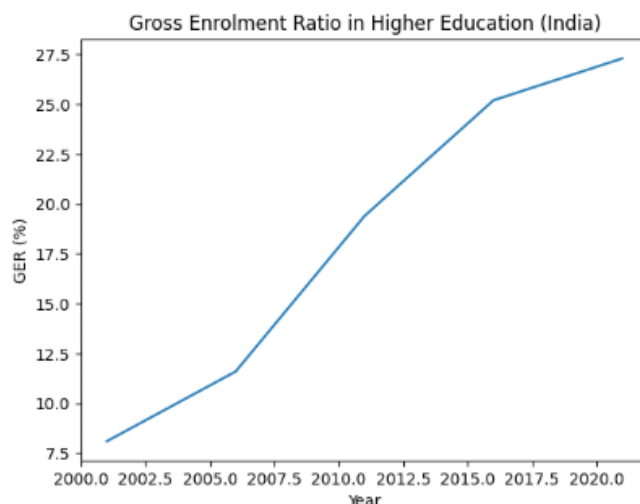


Figure 2: Illustrates the steady rise in enrolment, highlighting both progress and the need for further expansion
